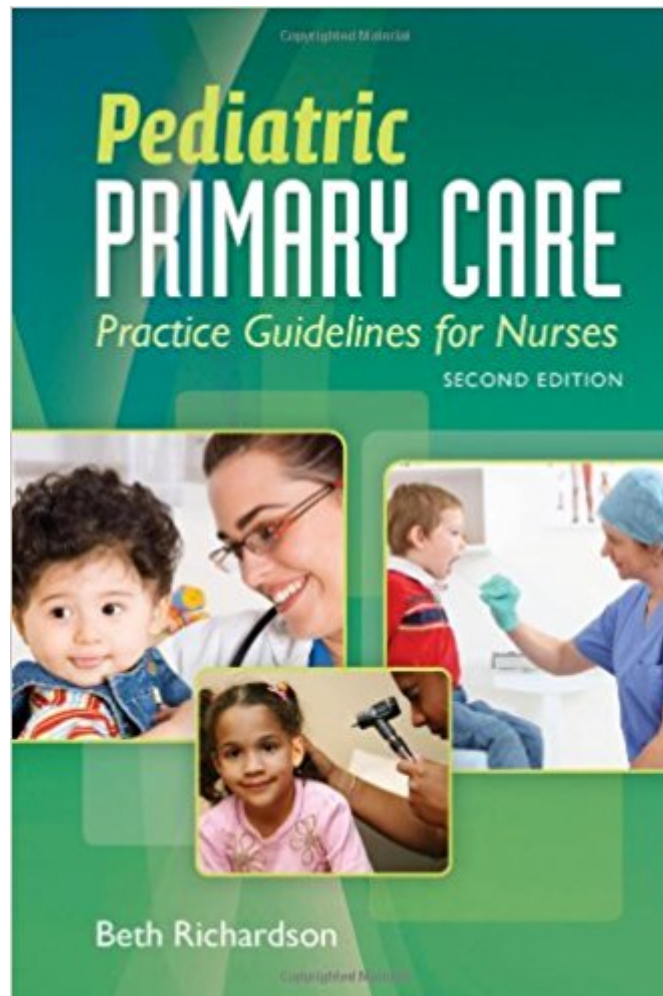




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# Pediatric Primary Care: Practice Guidelines For Nurses

I was surprised to find this a spiral bound book, but I do like the content. It is laid out in an outline, and provides etiology, occurrence, clinical presentation or manifestation, what you might find on physical exam, diagnostic tests, potential differential diagnoses, treatment and follow-up. Possible complications and education are also considered. I was a little surprised to find the rule of 9's for burns on an adult rather than a child or infant, as there is some variance there. But as a new PNP or one going in to primary care after being out for a while, as well as an FNP who has a small group of children in their practice, I think it is a great guide.

Very disappointed by the lack of updated information. This is a word-for-word copy of the 2nd edition which was written in 2011. The only difference is the chapter about Genetic Conditions. It still lists Auralgan as a medication when it was pulled from the market in 2015. I really like the 2nd

edition, but it is somewhat out of date with certain information and was looking forward to an updated version. Even the ADA's recommendation for Fluoride toothpaste recommendation was updated in 2014; however this book still talks about prior recommendations. Save the money and buy the 2nd edition off of half.com .

It is a friendly resource for a new Pediatric NP. My suggestion is to include diagnosis, treatments, lab works that closely applicable or reimbursable by Medicaid since 90% of my patients are poor and don't have private insurance. This request might be difficult since insurance payment may be different in each state or may change from time to time. I hope I am making sense. Overall this book is very helpful as an alternative to a phone app.

A lot of information in a small area, not as easy to read as I would like. The information is to the point, the book itself is just a little busy. A book as expected with diagnosis codes which makes it easier for CPT and ICD10 codes.

This is a great resource for PNPs, PNP students, and FNP's providing care to children. It is easy to use, comprehensive, and written in a way that makes it a good parent teaching tool. She includes an exhaustive differential for each diagnosis and also includes applicable ICD9 codes, which in this day and age, is so helpful for many of us! Every clinician should have this on their shelf. Well worth the money!
