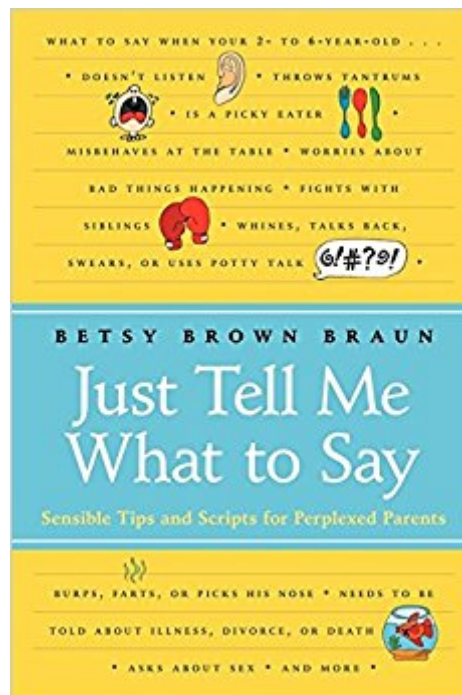




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Just Tell Me What To Say: Sensible Tips And Scripts For Perplexed Parents
